



# ANYONE FOR KOOYONG?

As someone who tastes a lot of wine every year with the Rathdownne Cellars tasting panel, I tire of the passing parade of weaker wines in tough years, that are not up to the standards of what we want to carry in store, and sometimes not of the standards of previous releases from the same label. I very well understand vintage variation, but my wallet also understands that in poorer or tougher years, prices never seem to drop correspondingly. One of the serial offenders has been Mornington Peninsula Pinot Noir. This is not to say that the Yarra, Adelaide Hills, Tasmania or any other Pinot producing region you'd care to name is immune to these difficulties; just that some areas deliver good or great wines more consistently than others do. **For every great bottle of Main Ridge Half Acre Pinot, Paringa Estate or Stonier's Reserve, there are dozens of disappointing overcropped, under ripe, thin, poorly-made Mornington Pinots that represent neither quality nor value for money.**

When they're not up to scratch, good labels shouldn't release them - it's as simple as that. Giaconda's McClay Road releases earlier this year exemplified this approach, where the wines weren't up to the label's reputation, and thus not to the usual price! There is a shining star in the south, and it's name is Kooyong. Rathdownne Cellars has carried several vintages of their Estate range of wines (a Chardonnay and a Pinot Noir identifiable by a buff coloured label with 'KOOYONG' in large text). Astute readers may recall the arrival of the Single Vineyard wines some time back: - Faultline and Mosaic Chardonnays, and Haven Pinot Noir, identifiable by more colourful labels with the individual vineyard name largest on the label.

## Clonakilla Riesling 2005

Renowned for their wickedly good Shiraz Viognier and great value Hilltops Shiraz, Clonakilla also make this tasty little number. Juicy acid with a well defined structure. Great limey Riesling, fresh & crisp. Tim Kirk is making better Riesling year after year. Quite limited. *Ageing - Drink now or cellar for up to 8 years.*

## Shaw & Smith Sauvignon Blanc 2005

Shaw & Smith have been one of the producers responsible for the resurgence of Sauvignon Blanc in Australia. Often referred to as the benchmark Australian Sauvignon Blanc. All of their fruit is sourced from the Adelaide Hills and the wine made at their state of the art winery in Balhannah. Grassy with overtones of passionfruit yet quite delicate on the finish. Perfect with Yum Cha or almost any style of Asian food. *Ageing - Drink now.*

## Savaterre Chardonnay 2003

### Savaterre Pinot Noir 2003

From an extremely hot year, Beechworth newcomer Keppell Smith has all but pulled a rabbit out of his hat. While other producers in the region have declassified their wines, Keppell managed to produce two excellent wines that show the terroir of Savaterre. Sure they're not quite as elegant in their approach, but

then given the year that's to be expected. What they are however, is complex examples of what Beechworth does so well. The chardonnay is tight, textured and layered, with great minerality. The Pinot shows the Savaterre flair, the complexity and texture with subtle tannins, good fruit weight, and all balanced with perfume and more Beechworth minerals. *Ageing - Drink over next 3-6+ years.*

## Port Phillip Estate Sauvignon Blanc 2004

Great fruit from a single vineyard in Mornington, now made by Sandro Mosele. Great minerality with complexing barrel ferment characters, it smells and tastes like Sauvignon Blanc but with a twist. Serve with a prawn & pea risotto - start with some fennel and stir through a little mint. Spice it up with Chillli if you like it hot. *Ageing - Enjoy over the next couple of years.*

## Craiglee Shiraz 2003

Originally planted in 1860 and then replanted by Pat Carmody in 1976. The lucky few who have been fortunate enough to try wines from the original plantings in recent times will attest to the potential of this great site. The same quality is equally reflected in Pat's excellent wines. Sophisticated, fresh wines with a huge drinkability factor, that also have a great track record for cellaring. *Ageing - Cellar this one for up to 15 years.*



## Rockford 'Rod & Spur' 2002

A very impressive release this year for Rockford's quintessential Aussie blend - Shiraz & Cabernet. Treated just like their famed Basket Press, this vintage is a great example of Barossa at it's best. Medium in weight, yet very complex and balanced. It's seamless in it's delivery of the subtle fruit, fine tannin and has the right balance of alcohol and acid to do it justice in the cellar too. All in all a great wine. *Ageing - 2006-2014.*

## Izway "Mates" 2004

This ultra-boutique producer based in the heart and soul of the Barossa has come up with a classy red blend that will blow your mind. A blend of Grenache 50%, Mataro 25% and Shiraz 25% that's medium weight, juicy and great quaffing. Named "Mates" as a dedication to those in the World of Wine that have inspired them to make great wine. *Ageing - Drink over next few years.*

## Red Edge "Degrees" Shiraz 2004

A classically styled and wholly underpriced Heathcote Shiraz that delivers fresh red berries, spice, earth and much more. Peter Dredge blends about 12% Mataro and 3% Riesling into this Shiraz giving it wonderful floral notes. *Ageing - Drink now or over the next 5-8 years.*



## Ponalowie Shiraz Viognier 2003, Special Release Shiraz 2003 and Special Release Tempranillo 2003

Production of these wines will certainly not equal demand, but Dominic and Krystina Morris have doled out a meagre allocation for us. If you've tried their standard Shiraz and Tempranillo (and you should) the Special Releases certainly show the full potential of what they can achieve, and the Shiraz Viognier is the best we've seen from Dominic. James

Halliday recently scored these wines between 92-96/100 and says they will last until 2020. *Ageing - The cellaring possibilities vary, but at least 3 years plus.*

## Kiltynane Estate Blanc Noir 2004

Kate Kirkhope is a dedicated Pinotophile. With the help of Frederic Blanck, wine maker at Paul Blanck et Fils in Alsace, Kate has made a very unique wine - a white wine from Pinot Noir. Following biodynamic practices with wild fermentation in barrel and minimal handling, she has crafted this complex, rich wine. *Ageing - Best over the next couple of years.*

## Bellvale Pinot Noir 2003

One of the rising stars of Gippsland again re-enforcing the match for Gippsland and Pinot. From pilot to Vigneron John Ellis (no, not the Hanging Rock Ellis) planted his vineyard in 1998 with the help of Gippsland Pinot guru Philip Jones, at a high density of 7150 vines per hectare, and now it is starting to show its potential. Bellvale are making Pinot with excellent texture, juicy cherry fruit that is a whole load of fun. Watch out for these guys they are just going to get better and better. *Ageing - Drink right now or put down for 3-4 years.*



## William Downie Pinot Noir 2004

Last years debut release turned out to be an eye opener for many with it's terrific depth and Burgundian aspects. One year on, 2004 has delivered another winner for Bill Downie. This year it's a shade less complex, but all the features are there that should turn Bill Downie into one of the "must have Pinots". *Ageing - Should be good for 5-6 years.*

## Balgownie Bendigo Cabernet Merlot 2003

The fruit for this comes from the same vineyard that produces the Balgownie Estate Cabernet Sauvignon, which is in itself a great start given the track record of the Estate Cabernet. It's a pretty rich wine with great fine (but soft) tannins, and has a long finish. This is wine was made for immediate drinking, *Ageing - over next 3-5 years.*

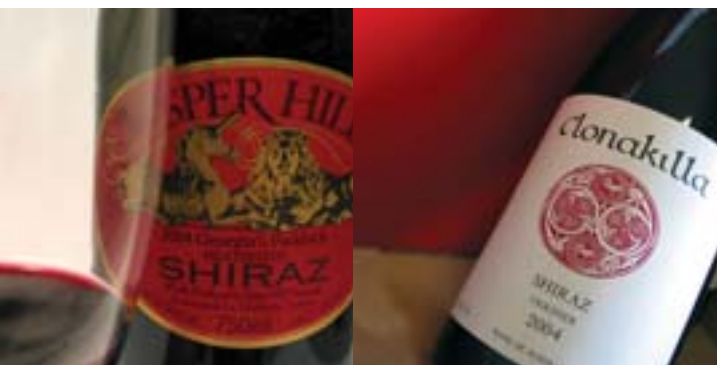
## Ulithorne 'Frux Frugis' Shiraz 2003

This is the third vintage we've had from this terrific little winery in McLaren Vale, and it shows no signs of slowing down whatsoever. Back to the more restrained form of the 2001, we were really impressed with the depth and elegance of this rather big wine. It opened up very well and stood up overnight too, which is a great sign for those that can hold off drinking it and put it in the cellar! *Ageing - up to 8 years.*

# WHAT'S HOT AND WHAT'S NOT

The August/September Gourmet Traveller Wine magazine had a feature article relating to Langton's Wine Classification system which has been upgraded again to incorporate public interest in premium Australian wines. It is not a rating system based on quality or marks out of 100, but rather an "unofficial honour roll" or "form guide" of Australia's ultra fine wine market.

The ratings are compiled on secondary market pricing and are based on volume of demand, track record and price realisation. This is Wine Classification 4 and it will be reviewed every 5 years, one of the criteria being that a particular wine must have been produced over 10 vintages, which eliminates some of the "flash in the pan" wines we see quite regularly. **You need a solid track record to make it into this listing.**



## Exceptional

The best of the best (there were 11 wines listed this year). Penfolds Grange, Bass Phillip Reserve Pinot Noir, Cullen Dianna Madeline Cabernet Sauvignon Merlot, Giaconda Chardonnay, Henschke Hill of Grace, Leeuwin Estate Art Series Chardonnay, Moss Wood Cabernet Sauvignon, Mount Mary Quintet, Penfolds Bin 707 Cabernet Sauvignon, Rockford Basket Press Shiraz and Wendouree Shiraz.

## Bridge Road Brewers Beechworth Wheat Ale

Just for a change I've decided to leave the champion beer making grain, barley, in the shadows and focus on the stuff of breakfast cereals and top quality beer... wheat. Germany and Belgium are the undisputable leaders when it comes to brewing with malted wheat.

But despite what the name implies wheat beers/ales are only ever made up of 30-70% malted wheat, with the balance being made up of malted barley (or heaven forbid other adjuncts). Malted wheat has quite a different make up to that of brother in arms (or leglessness), apart from giving a different flavour spectrum, it has very thin husks that don't efficiently filter the mash which is one reason why it cannot be solely used in beer making. Wheat also contains high amounts of protein which gives a very fine white haze which is considered unsightly in most beer styles but celebrated in wheat beers. The protein content also accounts for a good head.

This Wheat Ale from Beechworth has certainly is impressive. Made in a true Bavarian wheat beer style it is cloudy, highly carbonated, copper in colour with extroverted aromas of banana and cloves! This beer has an extremely low hop profile and relies on its fruity esters produced during fermentation to fill the palate. Its dry tart finish and lingering estery flavour makes this a great thirst quencher for spring. Drink this with simple seafood dishes such as salmon tartlets.

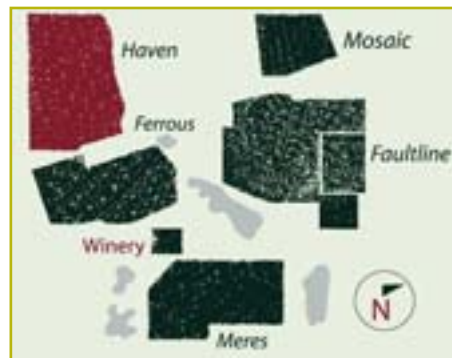

## ANYONE FOR KOOYONG (continued from front)

Well those were the 2001s, and September has brought with it the release of the 2003 Single Vineyard wines from Kooyong and the new 2003 Estate wines as well. I'm rapt to be able to inform you that Kooyong took a hard decision: - winemaker Sandro Mosele's standards for the Kooyong wines were not met in 2002, so none were released. This sets a fine example for all producers, having the balls to do likewise.

In the lead up to the release of these wines on September 1, I sat down with Peter Kopiec (Sandro Mosele's right-hand man, who moonlights with his own label 'Sabotage') to taste the entire range, and I was especially keen to see the Single Vineyard Series, with 2 of those vineyards making their debut.



Kooyong has 30 hectares of Pinot Noir & Chardonnay on a north-facing slope at Tuerong on the Peninsula. A quick look at the back label shows not only a map of the vineyard site, with the 5 individual vineyards on display, and also a brief description of the attributes of that individual site.

The Faultline Chardonnay is fine and elegant, with concentrated fruit, oatmeal aromas, and a fine mineral character on the palate. Named for the geological fault that runs through part of the

vineyard, the wines show richness and fullness with an emphasis on mineral characters, and a delicious concentration and fineness on the palate.

**The three single vineyard pinots are remarkably different for wines that come from vineyards that are only a few hundred metres from each other.** A 'mere' is another term for a lake or pond, and the 'Meres' vineyard at Kooyong is indeed surrounded on 3 sides by ponds. This pinot is the most approachable of the 3 on release. It shows a fine perfume of berries, upfront ripe and fleshy fruit characters, but with the structure to lie down in a cellar.

The debut release of 'Ferrous' is so named because of the presence of iron oxide-encrusted sandstone, giving a rusty appearance to the ground. Deemed as one of the most cellar-worthy of the Kooyong releases, the fruit concentration and tannins are a little more apparent, but my notes mention balance and elegance foremost, and my recollections are of fruit weight and power with underlying structure of acid and oak in a supporting role.

The final debutante is from the 'Haven' vineyard, so called because it is largely surrounded by trees that offer shelter from the northerly and southerly winds that blow across the peninsula. The 'Haven' is perhaps the most structured, the most cellar-worthy, and (unfortunately) the scarcest of the single vineyard releases. The wine I saw showed terrific balance, and great texture. **In Australia, we have gotten much better at producing balance, fruit and oak flavours in our Pinot, but the real challenge confronting many of our producers is in getting the wines to display great texture;** Kooyong are well over this hurdle, and all the wines showed good to great texture. Only a handful of barrels were made of 'Haven', meaning that there are only very limited opportunities to see for yourself how the wines do travel over time.

**The Kooyong new releases have just arrived in store. Supplies are extremely limited. Rush in for your piece of one of the Peninsula's finest.**

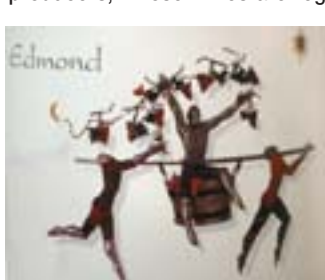
**Josmeyer "Jean Meyer" Riesling 2003**

**Alphonse Mellot Sancerre**

Like Didier Dageaneau, Alphonse is another of Sancerre's Biodynamic producers, whose wines are regarded by many as being on par with



Didier. Sancerre is the home of Sauvignon Blanc, and Alphonse holds the flag high. His 2004 "La Moussière" is beautifully refined, a great example of the true potential of Sauvignon Blanc. While the "Cuvee Edmond" comes from vines aged 40-87 years old, is 100% barrel fermented and aged this is clearly a benchmark for the supremely complex and textured Sauvignon Blanc - so far so that it's almost White Burgundy in depth and texture.

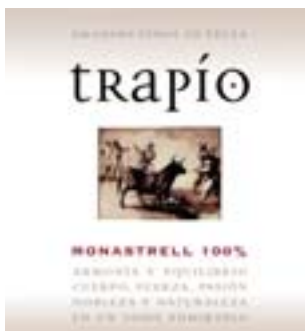
**Domaine de l'ameillaud**

**vin de pays de Vaucluse 2003**

Made by Englishman Nick Thompson from Grenache, Syrah and Carignan. Unoaked and all the better for it. Vaucluse is one of the lesser know appellation of the Rhône. Heaps of character, heaps of juicy fruit and spice. One of the best value wines coming out of the Rhône.

**Trappio Monastrell 2002**

100% Monastrell (aka Mataro, aka Mourvedre), this wine is from 70 year old vines, from original clones of Monastrell that predate phylloxera! Grown at 1000m altitude about 1 1/2 hrs inland to the West of Alicante, this wine has made Australian producers regret grubbing out their old Mataro vines!



**Veuve Bonneval Champagne NV**

Its not often you can get Champagne under \$50, and it's even less common for it to be this good! But this fizz, which is authentic Champagne is terrific value, and all you could want from Champagne – complex, rich, creamy and yummy!

After extensive tastings and then doing some more tasting... at home with our feet up just to be sure, we can finally relax knowing that we have got some fantastic wines under our own label. It would seem that the 'glut' of wine currently seen has at least one up side, there is so much good fruit out there going cheap every one has the ability to make good wine at a great price. But don't just take our word for it.

**Get a little 'vibrant' in your life**

I have been immersed in Kylie Kwong recipes lately and have adapted an aptly named one - 'Chicken with vibrant flavours'. Perfect for the change in seasons...

- 4 chicken thighs (skin on)
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 2 large carrots peeled and in chunks
- 2 medium onions, peeled and sliced
- 2 tsp grated ginger
- 4 crushed garlic cloves
- 1 tsp each turmeric & ground cumin
- Juice and grated peel of 2 lemons
- 8 dates (I used pitted packet ones)
- 2 1/2 tabs brown sugar
- 4 bruised red chillies
- 1 lemon or lime quartered
- 4 bay leaves

- 2 tsp salt, 1 tsp black pepper
- 2 tabs fish sauce
- 2 tabs vinegar (pref. sherry, not malt)
- 1 400g can whole roma tomatoes
- 1 cup red wine, 1/2 cup water

Brown the chicken in heated oil. Lift chicken out and saute onions and carrots for a few minutes. Add ginger, garlic, cumin and turmeric and stir for a minute or two. Add juice only from the tomatoes and all other ingredients. Bring to boil, return chicken to pot, and cook at a gentle simmer for 40 minutes. Add tomatoes and cook a further 10 minutes. Serves 4 (or 2!!!)  
Great with cous cous or rice.

Cameron suggests drinking: **Domaine Ramonet Bourgogne Rouge 2000** at \$35. Bonza, and thak you Ms Kwong.
